AIMS OF THE DOCUMENT

The aims of this document are to:

- define the structure of the programme;
- specify the programme award titles;
- identify programme and level learning outcomes;
- articulate the regulations governing the awards defined within the document.

AIMS OF THE PROGRAMME

The general aim of this programme is to provide students with an academically rigorous programme of education in the functioning of legal knowledge to enable them to either a) undertake the Solicitors Qualifying Exam (SQE) Part 1 or b) progress to a career at the Bar. Further to this, it is envisioned that students will develop professional skills necessary to enter the legal profession as critically informed, agile and resourceful graduates.

This programme aims to enable students to:

1. Gain understanding of the functioning of legal knowledge as required by the SQE 1;
2. Analyse functioning legal knowledge so that students possess a clear, systematic and critical understanding of the role of law in society;
3. Progress students' independent research skills, and introduce students to specific means of accessing legal information and resources;
4. Develop students' legal writing skills;
5. Build upon the students' acquired legal knowledge to enable them to work in practice;
6. Teach students the legal skills necessary for the practice of law; and
7. Evaluate the practice of law so that students can understand the ethical considerations necessary to become a reflective contemporary practitioner.

ALIGNMENT WITH THE UNIVERSITY'S STRATEGIC PLAN

This programme aligns with Bournemouth University's new Strategic Vision (BU 2025) of inspiring learning, advancing knowledge and enriching society.

The Faculty of Media and Communication delivery planning supports teaching which benefits from research of international excellence and expertise in professional practice to enable the delivery of research and practice-led and informed teaching and prepares students for work in the legal professions or other graduate employment. In addition, many units cover elements relating to the UN Development goals such as of [Lifelong Learning \(UNSG 4\)](#), [Innovative and Sustainable Industry \(UNSG 9\)](#), and [Sustainable Patterns of Production and Consumption \(UNSG 12\)](#) and encouraging students to consider their responsibility as both professionals and citizens for shaping the world around them.

The Department of Humanities & Law is aligned with the University's 2025 Vision, Values and Strategic Plan to inspire learning, advance knowledge and enrich society through our values of excellence, inclusivity, creativity and responsibility. Our work is interdisciplinary in nature, incorporating theory and practice to address the difficult questions of our time through debate and critical thinking. As a Department we are concerned with the relationships and

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intersections between culture and society, tradition and innovation, social justice and policy. This is enhanced through the creation of a learned environment that is diverse and inclusive by its nature. We develop our skills through exposure to integrated theories and approaches and probing issues in-depth to provide critical and creative insights. Our students are equipped to work in traditional, defined professions but are also able to adapt to new and emerging roles. The LLM Legal Practice fuses the learning of academic legal knowledge (known as functioning legal knowledge) and the development of professional practice skills to create holistic lawyers.

LEARNING HOURS AND ASSESSMENT

Bournemouth University taught programmes are composed of units of study, which are assigned a credit value indicating the amount of learning undertaken. The minimum credit value of a unit is normally 20 credits, above which credit values normally increase at 20-point intervals. 20 credits is the equivalent of 200 study hours required of the student, including lectures, seminars, assessment and independent study. 20 University credits are equivalent to 10 European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) credits.

The assessment workload for a unit should consider the total time devoted to study, including the assessment workload (i.e. formative and summative assessment) and the taught elements and independent study workload (i.e. lectures, seminars, preparatory work, practical activities, reading, and critical reflection).

Assessment per 20 credit unit should normally consist of 3,000 words or equivalent. Dissertations and Level 6 and 7 Final Projects are distinct from other assessment types. The word count for these assignments is 5,000 words per 20 credits, recognising that undertaking an in-depth piece of original research as the capstone to a degree is pedagogically sound.

This LLM Programme does not incorporate the sitting of the SQE 1 assessments. Students will be required to enroll externally for the SQE 1 assessments at one of the SRA's authorised providers. Consequentially, this Programme does not include the examination fee for the SQE 1 assessments, students will be required to fund this separately.

STAFF DELIVERING THE PROGRAMME

Students will usually be taught by a combination of senior academic staff with others who have relevant expertise including – where appropriate according to the content of the unit – academic staff, qualified professional practitioners, demonstrators/technicians and research students.
